

Impressive International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme (IBDP) Results for Waterford!

Highest Grade in Eight Years!

Waterford Kamhlaba's IB Class of 2019 maintained the school's impressive performance in the International Baccalaureate Diploma examinations, with one candidate attaining the highest possible score of 45 points!

Out of the 113 students who sat for the globally competitive pre-university programme, 92% were awarded a diploma and 8% were awarded certificates. The highest grade in 2019 was 45 points which is a perfect score – a tremendous achievement indeed. Impressively, 12.4% of students achieved a score of 36 points and above and 27.4% of the students achieved a Bilingual Diploma.

The college's principal, Mr. Stephen Lowry, commended the students for their achievements: "We are really very proud of all our students and their teachers. The results are the fruit of two years of hard work and sustained effort. We congratulate the students and wish them continued success in their future endeavours. We hope they will continue to embrace the values of the United World College movement in their next stages of life. We recognise that education is a team effort and, as such, we are very grateful to everyone who supported the students, the teachers and the school in various ways throughout the year, from members of our Governing Council, parents, alumni and donors," he said. He further noted that Waterford Kamhlaba continues to be a valuable national asset in that it contributes to the development of Eswatini through the education offered by the school and the achievements of the students.

For the class of 2019, the focus now switches to university applications. Already, some students have been offered places in tertiary institutions in the United States, Canada, the United Kingdom and South Africa. "There is little doubt that students of the class of 2019 will be offered places at universities and colleges where they will continue to learn and acquire the knowledge necessary to equip them to work for peace and a sustainable future" said Lowry.
